

HOW DO I MAINTAIN MY CERTIFICATION?



Congratulations on becoming a Board Certified **Diplomate of the American Board of Optometry**, and entering the Maintenance of Certification (MOC) program! MOC is a four-part process for continuous learning, based on a model developed by the American Board of Medical Specialties.

WHAT ARE THE REQUIREMENTS FOR MOC ?

You have already demonstrated that you are in active practice and maintain a valid state license in therapeutic optometry. And you have passed your Board Certification exam, which is retaken every 10 years. You are ready to enter the MOC process, which consists of:

- **Lifelong Learning and Self-Assessment** — Continuing education and Self-Assessment Modules (SAMs).
- **Practice Performance Assessment** — Performance in Practice Modules (PPMs).

The American Board of Optometry's 10-year MOC cycle is divided into three 3-year stages plus a certification examination year. In each of Stages 1, 2 and 3, the Diplomate must meet the following requirements:

1. **Two Self-Assessment Modules** or SAMs
2. **Performance in Practice Module** or PPM
(*Note: One SAM or PPM module must be completed each calendar year.*)
3. **100 points from educational activities** over each three-year period. At least 50 percent must come from Category 1 education (live approved lectures), and up to 50 percent can come from Category 2 (including distance learning and scholarly activities).

All MOC requirements must be completed for the Diplomate to be eligible for the recertification examination toward the end of the 10-year cycle. A Diplomate can take the recertification exam in either the ninth or tenth year of the cycle.

The current annual maintenance fee is \$225 which includes ongoing web portal access, and the SAM and PPM modules. This fee is due in January each year.
